RE: Waste Management Expansion Request

Gentlemen:

I attended the 1:00PM, July 16, 2014 public comment session held at the LewPort High School with the purpose of getting a better understanding of the issues and opinions around Waste Management's application to construct another landfill on their existing property. Before I begin my comments however, I would like to apologize to the siting committee for the behaviors of some attendees. I was appalled that some speakers were shouted at and insulted because they expressed views different from others in attendance.

Many people spoke and the majority were against Waste Management's request. However, many speakers supported their views that the landfill expansion should be denied by making comments that were identified, alleged, or alluded to be "facts". As they spoke, I tried to note some so that I could check their "facts" at a later time. A few examples that I noted and my findings:

Many speakers stated that this area has a "much higher cancer rate" than the rest of New York State. This certainly is troubling. However, when I went to the New York State Health Department's website <http://www.health.ny.gov/statistics/cancer/registry/> I found that the cancer rates in Niagara County are about the average for New York State (excluding New York City) and slightly higher with NYC included. I also went to the CDC's website <http://statecancerprofiles.cancer.gov/incidencerates/index.php?stateFIPS=01&cancer=047&race=00&type=incd> . Here too Niagara County was just slightly higher than the average for all of New York State. My key finding was that NONE of the data I found on either of these governmental websites supported the high cancer rates presented at the hearing.

Several people spoke of traffic accidents that involved Waste Management's trucks or trucks traveling to their facility. As I recall, one involved several cars and another that occurred some years ago that resulted in the death of the speaker's son. However, in neither case was the cargo being carried cited as a root or contributing cause of either accident. So I do not understand their relevance on Waste Management's permit request.

On my way into the hearing, I was handed a flier by RRG, a group opposed to the land fill construction. The flier provided various “information”, all of course presented as “fact”. One entry referred to Emelle, Alabama and the effect the landfill constructed there in 1980 by WMC (CWM in the flier) had on the town. The RRG flier stated, “the schools closed ... Residents abandoned homes”. Again, very troubling comments, so I did a cursory internet search and found the information provided to be questionable. According to the data that I found, Emelle is and has been a very small town. Population numbers were; 51 in 2013, 53 people in 2010 (their highest) and 44 in 1990. (I could not find 1980 info.) Apparently, the population has not changed significantly over the years and as far as the closing of **schools**, how many would a town of 50 have? Considering the many comments made at the hearing that a landfill causes cancer, I again checked the CDC website and found that the county (Sumter) where Emelle is located has cancer rates 10% lower than the average for Alabama.

Another quote from the RRG flier, “The Niagara County DOH has already reported twice the national average of childhood cancers”. Again a very troubling statistic, so I went to their website and found their 2010 annual report. The only cancer related listing I found referenced the New York State data and it was for adults. So back to the New York State Health Department’s website and the rates listed for children (up to 19 years old) show Niagara Counties’ rate was almost identical to the State’s average.

I am not writing this letter to support or to oppose the expansion of Waste Management’s construction of a new landfill. However, I do request that your committee look at Waste Management’s request objectively. Strip away all the hype, emotion, politics, and the questionable information submitted to your committee. Both the community and the Waste Management Corporation deserve a decision that is based on facts that your committee has verified as being true and accurate and on the applicable laws.

Subject: Public Comment Concerning CWM's RMU-2 Application

Dear Judge McClymonds :

As a Niagara County resident for over 10 years, I wish to take this opportunity to comment on CWM's applications to build and operate a new landfill, designated RMU-2, at its Model City site in Niagara County.

Under NO circumstances should the requested RMU-2 landfill be approved.

The rationale for prohibiting the construction and operation of RMU-2 is as follows:

- 1) There is an unacceptable risk of catastrophic accidents occurring by increasing the quantity of hazardous material transported to RMU-2; risks include haulage vehicle seepage, spillage or accident during transit to the site.
- 2) A new landfill would increase the probability of seepage of hazardous materials into both the Niagara River and Lake Ontario. In a similar vein, RMU-2 offers a new opportunity for the breach of a containment system and a catastrophic leak into the same water systems. The Niagara River, Lake Ontario and the other Great Lakes are the largest surface freshwater system on the Earth. All possible effort should be expended to protect this water system and a mainstay of this would be not allowing new potential source of contamination (RMU-2) and, if possible, the permanent mothballing of the existing one (RMU-1).
- 3) Niagara County has done more than its share in hosting activities that have hazardous elements in their makeup:
The Manhattan Project activities in Tonawanda and the original CWM landfill RMU-1 at Model City both constitute poor decisions made in the past. A move to establish RMU-2 does nothing to ameliorate the existing

risks associated with RMU-1 or any residual materials in Tonawanda but it does offer increased risk to the area and its population for contact with hazardous substances.

4) The western part of Niagara County (Niagara Falls up through Lewiston to Lake Ontario at Youngstown) is presented to the world as an international first class tourist destination. The vision of the area will not be enhanced by views of hazardous waste haulage or by the simple knowledge that the area immediately south-east of the mouth of the Niagara River is one of the most toxic in the North Eastern United States. The attractions that visitors seek in the region bring tens of millions of dollars to the area - RMU-2 does not do anything except negatively impact that revenue stream.

5) We have "paid the price" for hazardous waste issues in the past (Love Canal in the city of Niagara Falls for example) but by no means have we examined and treated all of the potentially disastrous sites in the area. RMU-2 should not be approved as it simply adds the risk of yet another long term problem that will need to be addressed.

6) Niagara County, New York State and the United States have a responsibility to manage our natural resources (i.e. land and water) properly for both our own population as well as our neighbors on the other side of the Niagara River in Canada. Any malfunction at a CWM facility that leaches into the adjacent water systems is an irreversible violation of that responsibility.

The legal framework and licensing procedures already in place allow us to prevent RMU-2 from becoming a reality - they should be used and CWM's RMU-2 application should be rejected.

I appreciate the opportunity to offer my comments.



The Lake Ontario Ordinance Works or LOOW Site, on which the current CWM landfill is located, a highly contaminated site on the surface of the ground. The "Love Canal" files in the State Archives in 33 boxes are actually the LOOW files. Radioactive waste was disposed of from all over the country on the surface of the ground. A surface and subsurface investigation for radioactive materials in any new landfill location on this site should be conducted before landfill construction occurs, which could expose workers to radiation. Any contaminated soils that should be removed should not simply be allowed to go back into the CWM landfill site, which has been the practice for years, but rather sent off-site for proper radioactive soil disposal. I am writing to voice my opposition to Chemical Waste's Management's permit to build RMU-2, a hazardous waste landfill in Niagara County, New York.

A huge hazardous waste landfill is not in the economic interest of a community whose chief sources of income are health, education, agriculture and tourism.

Hazardous waste landfills are not equitably distributed across New York State; Niagara County has the only one.

RMU-2 negatively affects the health and safety of residents living in the community; all trucks hauling hazardous waste and PCBs to CWM drive directly in front of the schools and a truck tipped over, spilling its toxic load in the road just past the Primary School. Trucks hauling waste to CWM routinely arrive at the gates leaking, according to DEC accounts, and have been involved in fatal accidents, including the death of Ryan Henderson, a Lewiston resident.
