DEC's Division of Environmental Remediation (DER) now distributes information about contaminated sites *electronically by email*.

DER cannot register your email address - only the email address owner can do so. If you already have signed up for the listserv for the county in which the site is located, you need do nothing.

- Receive information about all sites in a chosen county - read what you want, delete the rest;
- It helps the environment and stretches your tax dollars.

If “paperless” is not an option for you, call or write to the DER project manager identified in this fact sheet. Indicate that you need to receive paper copies of fact sheets through the Postal Service. Include the site name in your correspondence. The option to receive paper is available to individuals only. Groups, organizations, businesses, and government entities are assumed to have email access.

Interim Remedial Measure Public Comment Period

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), is proposing an expedited cleanup of contamination at the 280 West 155th Street site ("site") located at 280 West 155th Street, NY. Please see the map for the site location. The expedited cleanup activities are expected to begin in April 2021 and last about 3 months. The activities will be performed by 280 W 155TH STREET OWNER, L.L.C. ("applicant") with oversight provided by NYSDEC.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan for 30 days, from **March 31** through **April 30, 2021**.

Draft Interim Remedial Measure (IRM) Work Plan: An IRM is a cleanup activity that may be performed when a source of contamination or exposure pathway (the way in which a person may contact contamination) can be effectively addressed without extensive investigation and evaluation.

The draft IRM work plan describes upcoming cleanup activities that include:

- Excavating contaminated historic fill to 3 feet below grade and in some areas to 5 feet below grade to start installing Support of Excavation (SOE);
- Installing SOE; and
- Decommissioning monitoring wells.

Site Description: The site is located in Harlem, Manhattan. The site is a 0.86-acre, vacant, asphalt paved lot. It is bounded to the north by 155th Street and the 155th Street Viaduct followed by Holcombe Rucker Park, to the east by an asphalt paved parking lot, to the south by mixed use and

residential buildings, and to the west by Fredrick Douglass Boulevard followed by a mixed-use building. The site was historically used for commercial and industrial buildings; the site is currently zoned for commercial use. The neighborhood has been historically used for commercial, residential, and industrial purposes; recent development has primarily been commercial.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are petroleum-related volatile organic compounds (VOCs), chlorinated volatile organic compounds (CVOCs), semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs), and metals which are present site-wide in soil and groundwater. Petroleum product has been identified on top of the water table in some of the groundwater monitoring wells.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the plan as necessary, and approve the IRM work plan in consultation with NYSDOH. The approved work plan will be made available to the public (see "Where to Find Information" on the front page).

When the expedited cleanup activities are completed, a Construction Completion Report will be prepared that documents the activities that were performed.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business, or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by NYSDEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.
