## **Remedial Investigation Field Activities to Begin**

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) approved the Remedial Investigation work Plan (RIWP) for the Former United Hospital site ("site") located at 406 Boston Post Road, Port Chester, Westchester County on February 28, 2022. Please see the map for the site location.

**Remedial Investigation Work Plan:** The work plan, called a "Remedial Investigation Work Plan," (RIWP) was approved by NYSDEC under New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program. The investigation will be performed by BR RA Port Chester LLC and Boston Post Road Owner LLC ("Applicants") with oversight by NYSDEC and the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH).

**Demolition and Field Activities:** Investigation activities are planned to occur in two phases. The initial investigation activities (Phase I), which were originally scheduled to begin in April 2022, will begin in August and continue into September/October 2022. It is anticipated that demolition of the abandoned buildings at the site will begin soon after completion of the initial investigation activities, with demolition work estimated to take 12 months to complete. Once demolition is substantially complete, a second phase of investigation activities (Phase II) will be performed generally in areas that were previously inaccessible due to presence of the abandoned buildings.

**Community Air Monitoring:** NYSDEC and NYSDOH require implementation of the approved Community Air Monitoring Plan (CAMP) during building demolition and ground intrusive investigation work. This monitoring protects the surrounding community in that if action levels are triggered, corrective measures, which may include work stoppage, are implemented. The CAMP includes monitoring for airborne particulates and Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs).

In addition to the sources of information listed above, the Applicants have voluntarily established a website, <a href="https://formerunitedhospitalbcp.com/">https://formerunitedhospitalbcp.com/</a>, to disseminate information relative to the former hospital property. NYSDEC and NYSDOH have no involvement with and do not endorse the website or its contents.

Highlights of the Proposed Remedial Investigation: The investigation will define the nature and extent of contamination in soil, surface water, groundwater

and any other medium that may be potentially impacted by site contamination. Previous investigations at the site have detected semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs), metals and petroleum contamination in soil, and VOCs, SVOCs, and metals in groundwater.

Key components of the investigation work include:

- Installing soil borings and collecting soil samples to identify possible on-site sources of contamination;
- Collecting soil vapor samples;
- Installing groundwater monitoring wells and collecting groundwater samples to evaluate impacts resulting from site contamination; and
- Implementation of site specific health and safety plan and CAMP noted above.

**Next Steps:** When the investigation is completed, a report will be prepared and submitted to NYSDEC that summarizes the results. NYSDEC will review the report, make any necessary revisions and, if appropriate, approve the report.

After the investigation, a proposed cleanup plan, called a "Draft Remedial Action Work Plan" will be developed. The cleanup plan will include an evaluation of the proposed site remedy or recommend a no action or no further action alternative. The goal of the cleanup plan is to ensure the protection of public health and the environment. NYSDEC will present the proposed cleanup plan to the public for its review and comment during a 45-day comment period.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

**Site Description:** The site is 12.03-acres and is bordered on the west by Interstate 287 and High Street, on the south by High Street and Boston Post Road, on the east by Boston Post Road, and on the north by Abendroth Park. It currently consists of abandoned multi-winged main hospital building and several ancillary buildings with parking lots. The hospital operations began in 1915 and ceased in 2004. The site is currently unoccupied, and the surrounding area includes a park area, commercial businesses, and nearby residential neighborhoods.


