Retech expects to be operational in Buffalo by early summer

ground floor in the 1981 porion of the building, totaling 40,397 square feet, for research and development, and for its manufacturing operations. That includes an open-span area with a 200-ton crane. It will also take up 8,537 square feet of office space upstairs in the 1911 building, where President Earl Good and his executive team will be located.

"We're excited to be here," Good said. "We think Buffalo is a good area for us to expand.' Retech will qualify for up to

\$500,000 in Excelsior Jobs tax credits from Empire State Development Corp. if it meets its job targets.

The lease also means that the Northland Central building is now more than 93% leased. including the Northland Workforce Training Center, Buffalo Manufacturing Works and other tenants. Only a small amount of space - including the small third floor - remains

vacant, and BUDC officials are working to market it to other

potential tenants.
"This is certainly the kind of company that we were hoping for, that we expected," Brown said. "Retech's investment certainly will encourage other companies across the country to take a harder look at what's ing on here in Buffalo." Founded in 1963 and based

in Ukiah, Calif., Retech says it's the world's leading provider of vacuum and cold-hearth melting furnaces used primarily in the aerospace, defense and medical industries. The furnaces - which vary in size and dimensions – use electron beam, plasma and cold wall induction technology, unlike old steel mills.

Clients use Retech's technology and systems to melt, refine and cast titanium, nickel, alloys, "super alloys" and rare earth metals to manufacture parts that are in turn used by other companies, such as Boeing and Airbus. The company is also getting into metal powders

that are used in 3D printing. In 2011, the advanced manufacturing firm was acquired by Poland's SECO/Warwick Group, a global manufacturer of heat treatment, thermal processing, heat exchange and vacuum metallurgy technologies. The conglomerate operates 10 companies on three continents, with customers in almost 70 countries and production facilities in Poland, the

United States, India and China,

plus sales and service offices in other countries.

In November 2018, Retech announced that it would move much of its manufacturing and assembly work that was done in California to facilities in Swiebodzin, Poland.

The new operation in Buffalo will supplant that, while a sales and service office will remain in California. Retech has had a sales and service office at 6309 Main St. in Williamsville for the past two years, with 12

employees.
"Our company has many customers on the East Coast, and being in the Western New York area gives us the ability to provide excellent regional support to those customers," said Good, also managing director of the company. "This location also gives us the ability to build our staff with additional quality employees from the engineering and technology schools in the area.

Good and Retech were already familiar with Western New York prior to the lease. Retech already has customers in central and eastern New York, as well as at least one smaller client in Western New York, and it also has customers in Pennsylvania and Ohio, as well as "through the Rust Belt corridor," Good said. That makes Buffalo a central location - as well as being closer to Poland.

Additionally, Good is a Penn State graduate who lived for 28 years in Hershey, Pa., and his two daughters attended and

played soccer for Canisius College, so he and his wife came to Buffalo many times, and saw the reinvestment in the city firsthand. That led to the opening of the sales office, and eventually the relocation. Good and his wife bought a house in East Amherst in November. "There were certain things

that stood out about Buffalo,' Good said. "We saw all the development taking place in Buffalo and from different people we've talked to over the years. we understood Buffalo was growing and investing quite a bit in the entire community. We were interested in someplace that was putting an investment in and trying to bring in outside companies. This just happened to be a good fit.'

BUDC President Peter Cammarata said the agency expects to turn over the space to Retech by April 1, at which point Retech will invest funds for its own build-out. The company expects to be operational by early summer, Cammarata

juice in one of these bags? You can't throw them in the washing machine. I'll just pay the 5-cent fee for the paper bags and write it off as entertainment tax! Wegmans should take their 5-cent fee and add it into their employees' paychecks instead of doing the publicity stunt of donating the money.

Christmann: Bags used to wrap leaky items like meat and fish are exempt from the state ban, as are those used for deli meat, produce, items in the bulk aisle and unwrapped foods.

From Carolyn Lukaszewski: I understand the need to forgo single-use plastic bags, but I can't understand why Wegmans uses an ever increasing amount of plastic containers for all their prepared and other foodstuffs. Most of that is not recuclable.

Christmann: Wegmans said it is working on alter-natives with the Center for Sustainable Packaging at the Rochester Institute of Technology. The grocer has also switched from plastic straws and stir sticks to renewablefiber ones at all of its stores and work sites.

The chain's food bar containers are now recyclable and contain 40% less plastic than they used to. Some bakery boxes are made from 100% recycled paper content, the store's produce bags are made from 100% plant-based renewable materials and its rotisserie chicken pouches use 75% less plastic than its plastic domes did.

The changes are part of the company's Zero Waste program that began as a pilot at a Canandaigua store in 2016 and has since expanded to 30 stores.

From Edward Parker: All this hype over plastic bags, and yet no pushback over

"We don't have specific plans to eliminate bags in other markets. However, we will continue to focus on helping our customers shift to reusable bags," Mehaffy

The company has 101 stores in New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Virginia, Maryland, Massachusetts and North Carolina.

From Jeremy Sideris: Will Walmart be getting rid of theirs, too?

Christmann: Any merchant required to collect tax will no longer be able to provide plastic carryout bags, according to the state Department of Environmental Conservation. That includes Walmart. The big-box store began testing changes to its plastic bag policies back in September.

From Bob Kerwin: What are all those dog walkers going to use?

Christmann: Bags from the bulk and produce aisles will still be available, as will restaurant takeout bags, newspaper bags and pharmacy bags. Other than that,

those who have relied on free bags for cleaning up after dogs and cats will be responsible for buying them themselves. The state ban doesn't prevent consumers from buying trash bags or food storage bags like sandwich bags.

You can buy 60 dog waste bags from Dollar Tree for \$1. There are also biodegradable and compostable options

definitely 'helped' people enroll in those plans - setting up a special office to do so," Glied

Katherine Hempstead, who studies health data as a senior policy adviser with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, said changes in state policy might have played a role in lowering the number of people without insurance during that time period.

The downward trend "may reflect the fact that the state of New York expanded Medicaid in 1999 with the passage of the Health Care Reform Act," Hempstead said.

To support its claim, the campaign cited the ways the Bloomberg administration helped get people covered. Among them: Bloomberg signed legislation that re-

quired the city health department to provide pamphlets outlining public health insurance options in day care centers and required the centers to make them available to parents and guardians.

Through a grant from the New York State Health Foundation, New York City also set up a website in 2009 to educate people without insurance about their options. This included information on how to make health insurance more affordable and a tool to help individuals determine whether combining private and public insurance would bring down their costs.

The city introduced an online prescreening tool for health insurance eligibility in 2007, and it introduced online renewals of public insurance coverage in 2010.

The Affordable Care Act, former President Barack

Obama's health care initiative, passed in 2010 but did not substantially take effect until 2014. So, it probably did not affect the number of people who gained insurance before then, Hempstead said.
