Remedy Proposed for Brownfield Site Contamination; Public Comment Period Announced

The public is invited to comment on a proposed remedy being reviewed by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC), in consultation with the New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH), to address contamination related to the Hertel and Foundry site ("site") located at 356 Hertel Avenue and 42 Foundry Street, Buffalo, Erie County. Please see the map for the site location.

How to Comment: NYSDEC is accepting written comments about the proposed plan, called a "Remedial Investigation/Alternatives Analysis Report (RI/AAR) for 45 days, from March 9, 2022 through April 22, 2022.

Draft Remedial Work Plan: The proposed Unrestricted Use remedy consists of:

- Characterization and disposal of wastes (e.g., drums, etc.) from within the building;
- Excavation and off-site disposal of approximately 480 tons of soil/fill, from three discrete areas beneath the on-site building;
- Excavation and disposal of approximately 17,700 tons of contaminated soil/fil, from outside of the building, across the site;
- Collection and analysis of confirmation samples to ensure that Soil Cleanup Objectives (SCOs) have been met;
- Importing clean material that meets the established SCOs for use as backfill; and
- Implementing a Health and Safety Plan and Community Air Monitoring Plan during all ground intrusive activities.

The proposed remedy was developed by Kam Cleanup LLC ("applicant") after performing a detailed investigation of the site under New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP). The results of the site investigation and an outline of the proposed remedy are described in the draft RI/AAR, which is available for review at the document repository identified on this page.

Next Steps: NYSDEC will consider public comments, revise the cleanup plan as necessary, and issue a final Decision Document. NYSDOH must concur with the proposed remedy. After approval, the proposed remedy becomes the selected remedy. The applicant may then design and perform the cleanup action to address the site contamination, with oversight by NYSDEC and NYSDOH.

NYSDEC will keep the public informed throughout the investigation and cleanup of the site.

Site Description: The 2.99-acre site is comprised of two tax parcels that are located on the northwest corner of Hertel Avenue and Foundry Street in the City of Buffalo, Erie County. The site is bordered by vacant industrial property to the north, Hertel Avenue, railroad tracks, and a vacant industrial property to the south, railroad tracks to the west, and Foundry Street and residential, commercial, and vacant industrial properties to the east. The site is developed with a vacant, 115,000 square foot building. Undeveloped portions of the site are covered by asphalt, gravel, or vegetation.

The site was used industrially from at least 1916 through at least 1950 to produce malt and to process animal feed. Railroad tracks were located throughout the western and eastern portions of the site. An underground gasoline storage tank was located outside the building, in the southern part of the site until it was removed in 2002.

Summary of the Investigation: The primary contaminants of concern at the site are semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs) and metals, which are present site-wide in the soil/fill and groundwater.

Brownfield Cleanup Program: New York's Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) encourages the voluntary cleanup of contaminated properties known as "brownfields" so that they can be reused and redeveloped. These uses may include recreation, housing, business, or other uses. A brownfield site is any real property where a contaminant is present at levels exceeding the soil cleanup objectives or other health-based or environmental standards, criteria or guidance adopted by DEC that are applicable based on the reasonably anticipated use of the property, in accordance with applicable regulations.


